CHILDREN'S MINISTRY

It has been my joy to serve as the Interim Director of Children's Ministry since February 1 and as Director since November 1. I'm thankful to step into the role those before me have established with love and care.

Fourth's ministry to children has been a beacon of light to thousands of children over the years. We have an excellent curriculum, a child protection policy that helps us effectively safeguard the approximately 120 children under our care, and a catechism program that teaches 150 questions over a three–year period.

NEW ENDEAVORS

- The Memory Zone opened October 2 as we invited children to come to the Children's Library to recite foundational Bible verses. We are encouraging families to participate together so that the very youngest can come alongside older brothers and sisters, all memorizing the same verses together.
- The **Hymn of the Month** is an effort to "guard" the great hymns of the faith by helping our children come to know them and love them. We've begun teaching from our list of 36 hymns on a three–year–cycle. The hymns range from old to modern, but all are doctrinally rich, gospel–centered, and God–exalting. Currently, the children sing when they gather to learn catechism and during Children's Church.
- The **Welcome Team** now includes children in 2nd–5th grade who arrive 15 minutes before the 8:00 or 11:00 a.m. worship service, take their "post", and with bulletins in hand and a parent nearby greet those arriving for worship. The children get to serve the Lord in his house, on the special day he has appointed, and the adults who receive their greeting get a sweet reminder of God's grace at work in the generations to come.



 We deliver the Moses Basket to parents of new babies as the Lord adds precious gifts to their family and our church family. The basket contains a few goodies as well as a Hug-A-Bible (yes, there really is one).

None of this happens without God's people hearing his call to serve and follow. We give thanks for the many members of Fourth who serve so tirelessly.

COUNSELING

Professional and licensed Christian counseling has been a part of Fourth's ministry to the community for over 36 years. In 2022, Licensed Clinical Counselors Kevin Schick and Jessica Schick served 150 clients with a total of 1500 counseling sessions completed. Common concerns were anxiety, depression, relationship struggles, trauma, grief, and general mental, emotional, and spiritual well-being.

DEACONS

The Deacon Board is grateful that the congregation continues to strongly support our scripturally mandated mission through prayer, referrals, and financial gifts. We meet and pray with those who have requested assistance from the church or those whom a congregant or pastor refers to us. In discerning how best to distribute deacon funds, our guiding principle is that we are part of the larger church effort to make disciples. For believers, we seek to alleviate hindrances to walking with God. For the unchurched, we seek to make Christ's love well known and understood.

As things have opened up in the wake of COVID-19, we have returned to regular board meetings and also to in-person meetings with those who need help. A new moderator, Debbie Roberts, will begin her term in April. Please pray for a smooth transition and that the board will be effective in serving God's purposes here at Fourth.

We also served recently arrived Afghan families and recipients of our churchwide Food Drive as well as Fourth members, attenders, and others in need of encouragement during the Thanksgiving holidays. FOURTH FELLOWS

The third class of Fourth Fellows arrived in late August and quickly bonded over Welcome Weekend activities. After a week away for an orientation retreat, the fellows launched into their weekly rhythm of worship, work, study, and service.

The challenges of "starting well" after college — finding or starting a new job and getting established in a meaningful community with a church home and new friendships — are real. Fourth Fellows offers a structure to help navigate these and other challenges. Our work placement and host family teams help the fellows find meaningful jobs and wonderful families to connect with.

For some fellows, their host family is the first Christian household they have been a part of; for others it is an opportunity to learn how a different Christian family functions. Hearts and minds are shaped through weekly seminary classes, one-on-one mentoring with a seasoned church member, and weekly service both inside and outside the church (at Fourth Youth Bible studies and at Cornerstone School).

MISSION DMV

As we complete our second year, we are thrilled how the Lord has blessed Fourth with opportunities to love and serve our neighbors in Jesus' name. We began a new ministry in Afghan Resettlement, expanded our joint Fourth ministry initiatives, conducted two successful all–church Serve Day events, awarded \$75,000 in grants to our Mission DMV partners, and integrated more gospel sharing into our activities.

HIGHLIGHTS

We helped strengthen the ministries of our partners and directly assisted families in need by providing volunteers, board representation, financial support, and material items through drives and collections.

Serve Days

February

Nearly 50 volunteers served at Central Union Mission by cleaning dorms, providing administrative support, staffing the prayer station, and serving lunch and dinner. Dr. Todd Smedley led an evening worship service for all the men in the overnight shelter.

October

Over 80 volunteers served at Samaritan Inns, Central Union Mission, Camp Bennett, and Rockville Women's Center. We landscaped, painted, cooked, cleaned, and received volunteer training.

Samaritan Inns

Nearly 40 volunteers regularly participated in this ministry partnership.

- Quarterly worship service for clients/residents in treatment
- Monthly dinner fellowship with residents of Huff House Women's Transition Program
- Monthly meal drop-off for Clark Inn Women with Children Program

Rockville Women's Center

Four volunteers were trained to staff the Helpline and field calls from prospective clients. One on–call administrative volunteer is now serving as well.

YoungLives

- Nine volunteers provided childcare to children during club meetings and camps.
- Special Blessings provided meals for club events.
- 500-700 diapers were delivered each month.
- Children's Ministry stuffed 280 Easter eggs for 45 children of teen moms.

Cornerstone School

Fourth Fellows mentored students every Friday as readers to kindergarteners, buddies to middle schoolers, and helpers during lunch/recess. Fourth volunteers participated in the Cornerstone Partner relationship-building program and provided pro-bono architecture and facilities management advisory services.

Afghan Resettlement

Volunteers provided dedicated, ongoing support to seven newly arrived families:

- **Ministry of presence:** developed caring, Spirit-led relationships through meals, fellowship, and outings to parks/zoo/playgrounds; mentored in areas of cultural awareness and day-to-day coping.
- **Life skills:** provided employment assistance, driver education, English language instruction and proficiency, child tutoring, and immigration processing related assistance.
- Material needs: provided funds for necessities; provided clothing, food, furnishings, and other provisions through the generous giving of Fourth members.

Food Drive and Collection

Fourth responded to 12 monthly food drives/collections, providing food, clothing, and household items for area families in need, our missionaries Jose and Shari Cuesta's ministry in Baltimore, and the Afghan families under our care. The drive has recently been expanded to include residents of Samaritan Inns.





MISSIONS

The Missions Ministry of Fourth exists to advance God's kingdom worldwide through gospel-focused teaching, training, outreach, and mercy ministry. We support individual missionaries and partner organizations through financial and other means, with priority for least-reached people groups. The Missions Committee works to keep the congregation aware of and engaged with those we support and continues praying for them and for those who are yet unreached with the gospel.

Fourth's work in missions encompasses many avenues of ministry including theological training, mercy ministry, church planting, translation, evangelism, and ministry to children and youth.

HIGHLIGHTS

- The Annual Missions Conference in March celebrated God's Providential Care for His People. Starting in 2023, missions conferences will be held in the fall.
- The **Disaster Relief Fund** sent money through organizations and missionaries that we regularly support to help displaced people in Ukraine (\$20,000) and flood victims in Pakistan (\$10,000).
- We revised our **missionary retirement policy** to better care for the individual needs of our senior missionaries, those over age 70, who are either retired or continuing in ministry.

MISSIONS TRIPS AND TRAVEL

- Two groups from Fourth visited **Romanian Christian Enterprises** (**RCE**): A mixed-age group of 17 helped build a house for a resident named Albert, and college students helped with RCE's annual camp.
- In the summer, the Youth Ministry's high school seniors worked with an EPC church and a school in Bayamon, Puerto Rico, while the eighth graders returned to Wilmington, Delaware, to serve with UrbanPromise.
- In October, I traveled with some of Fourth's elders to the annual International Christian Community Eurasia pastors retreat in Teisendorf, Germany.

- Nicole married Feo with continued ministry in Southeast Asia.
- Bob and Esther Genheimer left Botswana to return to the United States.

- Dave and Kathy Lanham (retired) took a short-term mission trip to Senegal.

PARTNERSHIP CHANGES

- Dr. Robert Norris visited South Sudan, where our partnership experienced a dramatic renewal as God opened the door for preparations to launch the long-planned seminary following 20 years of war and uncertainty.
- The International Training Institute was dissolved.
- Sheepshead Bay Church (former church plant) closed and merged with Resurrection Clinton Hill in Brooklyn, New York.



This year continued to be one of post–pandemic rebuilding for our choirs and instrumental ensembles. By the grace of God and despite ongoing COVID–19 concerns, we were able to maintain a high level of activity and even add new opportunities to our program. To help smooth the **transition to two services** after Easter, the Sanctuary Choir sang at both the 8:00 and 11:00 a.m. services the first few Sundays, but now primarily sings at the 11:00 a.m. service.

- The **Children's Choir** grew in numbers and Sunday service participation.
- This fall, we restarted our **High School Choir** under the leadership of Wyeth Duncan, and the group has grown to 14 members.
- Ring Forth! and Bells of the Trinity continue to flourish under Mary Clark's leadership and have played for services throughout the year.
- The **Fourth Orchestra** has played for services on a regular rotation and had strong numbers for the Advent Carol Service.
- Fourth Strings has also flourished under the leadership of Susan Fuller and Briannah Steele with regular participation in Sunday services.
- Our one-day **Summer Music Camp** provided a great opportunity for 30 children to try out Fourth's musical offerings and then participate in Sunday services the next day.
- I'm thankful for the faithful and competent work of administrative assistant Erin Jones, which enabled all of us to do the work of the music ministry in an efficient and organized manner.

We look forward to our return to the Sanctuary and pray we can continue building on the robust participation we saw in 2022. We're grateful to partner with the church body as a whole in the proclamation of the gospel.

HIGHLIGHTS

- It was my joy to join the Fourth staff as Special Blessings Coordinator in July.
- Sunday School classes moved back into the church building in September, and Chime Choir practices resumed.
- Serving others was a priority as we prepared a meal for Young *Lives*, helped with three Food Drives, and joined with the Team in greeting on Sunday.
- Six students (middle school through adult) attended in-person Sunday School, and another joined via Zoom. Sessions featured 12 lessons on dependence and eight lessons on faith. Each class provided opportunities for participants to pray for one another.
- Monthly online meetings for the **Dads' and Moms' support groups** welcomed 13 parents from Fourth and as far away as Maine for book discussion, mutual encouragement, and prayer. HIGHLIGHTS

- We held two Wednesday morning G2G (Generation-to-Generation) Bible study groups and continued offering Zoom groups.
- Four **Women's Circles** met monthly in person in homes, and we heard rave reviews about their study of *Aging with Grace* by Sharon Betters and Susan Hunt.
- Spring: 100 women gathered at the Marriott in Chantilly, VA, for a one-day retreat with guest speaker Ellen Vaughn and testimonies from three Fourth women: Suki Dicker, Abigail Myrick, and Betsy West.
- Summer: Approximately 35 women took part in our weekly Book Clubs.
- Fall: G2G Bible Studies met in person at church on Wednesday mornings, taught by our own pastors and teaching team. Thursday night Zoom group continued, largely for women unable to come on Wednesday mornings, and we added a new Monday evening in-person group. Approximately 100 women attended weekly.




